Joyce without Borders 2019 North American James Joyce Symposium

12-16 June 2019, Mexico City

The 2019 North American James Joyce

Symposium will be jointly hosted by the National Autonomous University of Mexico (UNAM) and the Metropolitan Autonomous University (UAM). This will be the first annual gathering of Joyceans in the global south, as well as the first to host panels in both English and Spanish, and will thus foreground the excellent work on Joyce being done in both languages. Joyce has had a major impact on Latin American writers, who have found much to admire in Joyce's bold experimentalism; his fusing of experiential details with universal concepts; his baroque profusion of words, languages, and styles; his critique of hegemonic structures of family, nation, and creed; and his resistance to myriad manifestations of imperialism.

For individual papers (no more than 20 minutes in length), please submit the following information: First and last names, academic affiliation (if applicable), title of paper, a brief abstract (maximum 300


Walking in Wonder: Eternal Wisdom for a Modern World

Ireland in Europe: The 5th International Postgraduate Conference in Irish Studies, Prague

13–14 September 2019, Prague



Paper proposals representing postgraduate projects in the area of Irish Studies are invited for an international conference. The conference does not involve a registration fee. Publication options will be discussed as part of the closing session of the conference; these include a refereed collection of essays. In order to provide detailed feedback for each paper, the conference format will consist of 15-minute summaries followed by responses from nominated participants, who will respond to the complete paper as submitted in advance; their response will be followed by a general discussion. Participants should expect to be appointed as respondents to other papers. Complete papers are expected to be in the region of 3 000 words, with a submission date of 17 June 2019. The closing session, presented by established Irish Studies scholars, will focus on research and publication opportunities, career building,

and funding in Irish Studies. Paper abstracts of 250 words should be submitted **by 30 January 2019**. Abstracts must include the title of the paper, your name, e-mail address and institutional affiliation, as well as any AV requirements for the presentation. European Joint Doctorate (EJD) MOVES

MOVES is a Marie Skłodowska-Curie Innovative Training Network project funded by the European Union under the Horizon 2020 research and innovation programme. WHO CAN APPLY?

Early-Stage Researchers (ESR), who must, at the date of recruitment by the beneficiary, be in the first four years (full-time equivalent research experience) of their research careers and have not been awarded a doctoral degree. They can be of any nationality, but they must have resided or carried out their main activity outside the country of the recruiting university ("recruiting university" is the first university where they will pursue their research and do their training in EJD MOVES) in the 3 years immediately prior to their recruitment. In the case of researchers with refugee status, refugee procedure is not counted as a period of residence/activity in the country of the recruiting university.
